## Grass Root Organization for Human Development (GODH),

is a Lahore-based not-for-profit civil society organization working on the rights of indigenous people (gypsies) with a particular focus on women and children since 1998. The organization is considered to be one of the pioneering organizations in Pakistan that has been functioning as an instrument in bringing issue of the nomadic class into the mainstream development sector.

Females of indigenous communities play a vital role in household earnings by working as domestic workers, garbage pickers and beggars. These women often face discrimination and harassment at their workplace which reflects in their personality, growth, and development as a human. There is no focus on girls' education and early child marriage is very common.

GODH was selected as one of the shortterm grantees under the Issue-based responsive funding mechanism of the Women's Voice & Leadership – Pakistan (WVL-Pakistan). The Project is funded by Global Affairs Canada (GAC) and implemented by Oxfam Canada (OCA), in collaboration with Oxfam in Pakistan (OiP).

Theatre performances were organized through a contextualized approach in the 15 target communities based on the key messages of the project. The voice artists were taken from the local subculture to ensure that the people could understand the message in their own language and accent. All vocalists and puppeteers were given an honorarium for their performance and rehearsals.

A Young Women Committee Against Social Injustice (YWCASI) was made by selecting two females from each community to address the issues of female inequality. These committee members were given training on women's leadership and management by a gender consultant to gain a deeper insight into the issues related to women.

A line department meeting was also organized by GODH which was attended by the YWCASI members and relevant stakeholders including representatives from NADRA, Human Rights Ministry and National Commission of Pakistan. Since Gypsy women have a lot of issues regarding birth certificates and nikkah registrations, NADRA representatives shared different mechanisms for the registration of ID cards and Nikah. Several referral mechanisms were introduced by the officials to the gypsy women including women safety apps and helplines.
